WHAT IS TIP?

TRAUMA INTERVENTION PROGRAM NW, founded in 1992, is a group of specially trained and thoroughly screened volunteers who **provide emotional and practical support to victims of traumatic events** and their families in the first few hours following a tragedy.

TIP Volunteers support family and friends following suicides; natural or unexpected deaths; drownings; motor vehicle fatalities; victims of fires and crimes; witnesses to crimes and those affected by violence.



TIP is a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization, and every donation is tax deductible. Services are provided to clients and their families **free of charge and are made possible by donations** from local government, businesses, organizations, and individuals. TIP Volunteers respond immediately to any crisis **24-hours a day, 365-days a year**; averaging 180 calls per month.

TIP MISSION

Our volunteers provide emotional first aid to survivors of tragedy in order to ease their immediate suffering and facilitate their healing and long term recovery.

213 TIP VOLUNTEERS

TIP Volunteers are prepared, willing, and able to respond to scenes of crisis at a moment's notice.



33 TIP SUPPORT TEAM

TIP Support Team monitors all emergency communication requests, dispatches, and supports volunteers while on-scene and after each TIP Call.



21 TIP Teens

TIP Teens attend 16 different high school and primarily respond to schools, homes and hospitals.




40 HOURS PER MONTH

Every TIP Volunteer dedicates at least 40 hours to TIP each month.



95,000 READY-ALERT HOURS

TIP Volunteers are ready to respond on a 24/7 basis.

Received immediate and practical support after a crisis.

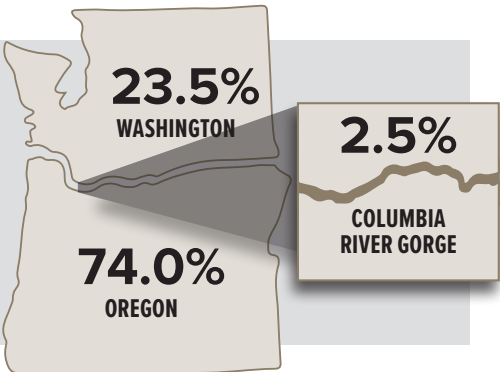

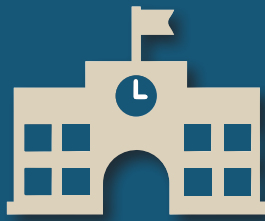

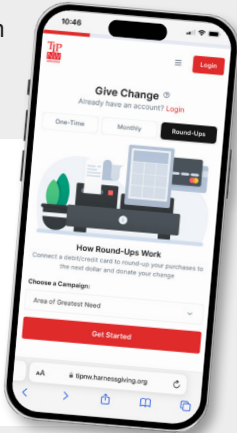
